

Father August Siebauer Dies, A Faculty Member Over 40 Years

Father August F. Siebauer, S.J., a member of the faculty of Campion High School for nearly forty years, died November 4, at the Prairie du Chien Memorial Hospital.

At the age of 89, Father Siebauer was the oldest member of the Wisconsin Province of the Society of Jesus. Earlier this year he had celebrated his 70th anniversary as a Jesuit. He was born October 18, 1880, in Mankato, Minnesota. He joined the Jesuits in 1899, was ordained in 1914. From then until 1931, he taught Latin, Greek, Religion and history at St. Louis University High School, St. Louis, Mo., Marquette High in Milwaukee, and John Carroll University, Cleveland, Ohio.



He came to Campion High School, Prairie du Chien, in 1931. He continued his teaching work there until 1954, and since that date had served as archivist and guest master. His great interest in the history of Western Wisconsin was well known; he addressed many historical groups and assisted scholars in locating information and records concerning the early settlers of the area.

Father Siebauer was well-known to many years of Campion graduates and their parents. At class reunions Father was always one of the most popular faculty members. At his 70th anniversary the alumni association announced the creation of a scholarship in Father's name. Any contributions to this scholarship can be sent to the Siebauer Scholarship, c/o of the Alumni Office at Campion.

Annual Fund Totals Over \$64,000

Father John Kelly Dies

Father John R. Kelly, S.J., 63, a member of the faculty of Campion High School since 1961, died November 30, during hospitalization at St. Mary's hospital, St. Bonifacius, Minnesota.

Following graduation from Campion in 1923, he entered the Jesuit Order at Forissant, Missouri. From 1927 to 1930 he studied in France; and was assigned to teach at Campion from 1930 to 1933. Father Kelly was ordained in 1936 at St. Mary's, Kansas, and taught at St. Louis University High School from 1938 to 1954 until he was selected as assistant to the provincial of the Wisconsin Province from 1954 to 1961. He returned to Campion in 1961 to continue his teaching work there until October 15, 1969, when he was transferred to Jesuit College in St. Bonifacius, Minnesota.

Father Kelly taught Classical languages, religion and French.

The Tension Has Eased, Racism Has Not Disappeared

There has been some racial tension at Campion since the admission of the first black student three years ago, but during the last week before Christmas vacation it was stronger, or at least more open, than at any previous time. You may have picked up some versions of the situation that would lead you to think that we are in a state of gang warfare or on the verge of an open revolt. We are not.

The recent tension was occasioned by the publication of a poem in a **Campionette** by a black student calling for revolution in words offensive to many readers. White over-reactions to the poem were met with black over-reactions. Several fist fights, a couple of black eyes, a few hate notes, and several meetings involving students and faculty members resulted. During vacation two of the white students involved in fights were withdrawn from school by their parents. Early in January four black students, also involved in the fights, were encouraged to withdraw and have done so. This action was taken, not because of their involvement in the fist fights, but for other disciplinary and academic reasons.

Those are the negatives; much good has come from these events. Every member of the Campion community has had to re-think his stance on the most serious crisis in American society. He has been forced to re-examine his basic attitudes toward his brothers, black and white. He has pondered again Father Hilbert's letter to all the parents last Spring concerning the school's position on the inclusion of black students. Father Hilbert said, "Understand that we are going to encourage the development of black identity, awareness of black culture and respect for it among the whites as well as among the blacks. That this will not always be smooth and free from trouble is recognized. The trouble, however, comes from the so-

ciety in which we live, and we cannot avoid it." Most of the members of the Campion community have re-committed themselves to continue this effort more acutely aware that "this will not always be smooth and free from trouble."

A man much admired died recently; he was Father Harry Linn, S.J., president of Creighton University. A few weeks before his death in a speech made at the university convocation he said, "The time has now come to admit openly, freely, and in the hope of future understanding that racial bigotry exists at Creighton University. In the residence halls, in the student center, and even in the classroom, students and faculty display a white racism which is intolerable in a Christian university. In hundreds of subtle, ignorant, and unplanned ways we all commit acts of insensitivity toward the black members of the university community which reflect our white racism . . . I would not want this situation to be magnified out of proportion, but on a Catholic university campus even small incidents of this nature merit the greatest attention . . . our common task this year must be to erase (racism) from our institution — to examine our attitudes and values, to seek greater understanding, and to make ourselves Christian in the most fundamental sense of the word. Only then can we raise our heads or proclaim this is a Christian university." These words very accurately describe Campion High School today.

Another quotation — this time from the Kerner Commission (National Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders): ". . . certain fundamental matters are clear. Of these, the most fundamental is the racial attitude and behavior of white Americans toward black Americans. Race prejudice has shaped our history decisively in the past and now threatens to do so again. White racism is essentially responsible for the explosive mixture which

has been accumulating in our cities since the end of World War II."

Going back to Father Hilbert's statement, "the trouble comes from the society in which we live, and we cannot avoid it," what has been occurring at the school is part of what he was referring to. The fundamental cause of the trouble here is the same as the fundamental cause of the trouble in American society; it is white racism.

Now this is a term which arouses angry feelings; we are not referring merely to overt bigotry, though there is clear evidence of that in the Campion community. But racism also includes a general insensitivity which Father Linn characterized as subtle, ignorant and unplanned; it includes an apathy, an unwillingness to be involved, a cowardice which keeps a student or an adult from taking a public stand for what he may dimly realize is right.

The faculty and student body of Campion face the future with hope and are determined to take a public stand for what they clearly realize is right. Awakened by recent events to a seriousness of the racial crisis in our nation and to the presence of racism in our community, we have begun to act. We believe there are two fundamental axioms for any healthy society: 1) a society must maintain peace and harmony; it cannot tolerate violence. 2) a society must make every effort to eradicate injustice of every kind; the injustice which provokes violence. We realize that to address ourselves only to the first, to demand law and order, would be a simplistic solution, no more effective here at Campion than it would be in our nation at large. Unless we erase injustice, racism, in our communities there will be violence.

This is what we are doing: a) we are taking whatever steps we deem necessary to prevent violence, physical or psychological. b) each department, especially the humanities, is making a thorough study of their curriculum to eliminate every form of racism. c) new courses in theology and literature have been inaugurated. d) we are seeking a black faculty member as a teacher and counselor to the black students. e) additional books on black literature and culture have been purchased by the library for both faculty and students. f) student leaders are initiating small group discussion to increase understanding among students. We are committed to work for a resolution of the social problems of our nation through education. Education is not the preservation of the status quo in a sanctuary apart from the tensions of our day nor is education at Campion a training ground for the black revolution. Our purpose is to build one Christian academic community in which men, black or white, can with equal dignity develop themselves in their culture in peace, but with increased mutual understanding and respect. To this end we must have basic norms of behavior and academic criteria applicable to all students; we must utilize the faculty now employed and study the curriculum now offered at Campion. If anyone, black or white, student or faculty, does not find this policy to his satisfaction or is not willing to cooperate, he should remove himself from the Campion community.

The tension has eased, racism has not disappeared. We have learned from our experiences; Campion is a better school for having endured this tension.

On November 8, in La Crosse, the Knights did battle with McDonell, confident of victory. However, a trip to the championship in Green Bay was denied by a stunning 38-16 loss to the Macs.
