

## Author, Physician Receive Edmund Campion Awards

Author Garry Wills, and Dr. Thomas F. Farrell received Edmund Campion Awards at the 91st commencement Sunday, May 23. Mr. Wills received the award to honor an outstanding alumnus and Dr. Farrell the award for distinguished service to Campion and the community. Mr. Wills also delivered the principal commencement address.

Dr. Farrell's many years of contributed service to students and the Jesuit community has made him one of the outstanding benefactors of the school. As a daily routine for thirty-three years, he has attended the ill and injured, confined to the Campion campus infirmary, giving encouragement and comfort to those in his care.

Dr. Farrell received his B.S. degree at Columbia College, Dubuque, Iowa in 1930. Following two years of pre-medical studies at the University of Wisconsin he entered the University of Pennsylvania where he earned his M.D. in 1934. During internship at St. Louis University he worked with the university affiliated schools and then entered private practice in Lancaster, Wis., prior to establishing a permanent practice in Prairie du Chien in the fall of 1935.

Dr. Farrell and the late Doctor John Kane, in 1941, provided the surrounding area with the services and facilities of the Beaumont Hospital. In 1957 the hospital was converted to a convalescent home at which time Dr. Farrell established the Farrell Clinic in connection with the newly built Memorial Hospital which also opened in 1957.

In 1938 Doctor Farrell and Juanita Heberer were married. They are the parents of five children: Mary Dianne, Thomas, Jr. (Campion '60), Jeanne Marie, Mark (Campion '64) and Maureen. He is a member of the state Medical Society of Wisconsin, President of the Board of the Peoples State Bank, a member of the Knights of Columbus and has held numerous offices on the county level through the past years.

Dr. Farrell is a charter member of the Campion Board of Regents, having served with distinction for the past three years.

Garry Wills has gained national prominence as a contributing editor of "Esquire", a syndicated newspaper columnist, and author of several books, including "The Second Civil War," an agonizing view of America's racial conflict and the frightening arms build-up of Blacks and Whites. In his widely syndicated column, "Outrider," Wills scouts the social and political movements in the nation, reporting and analyzing them with penetrating wit.

## Campion Dean Elected to Jesuit Board



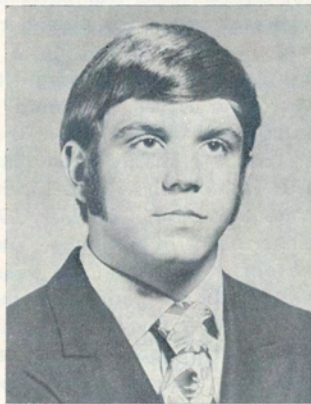

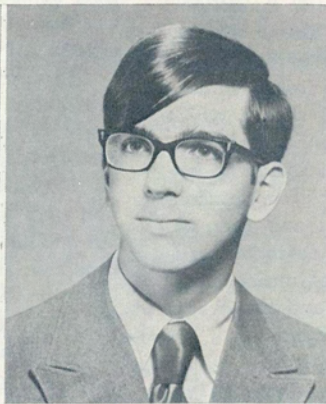

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Wills has received his widest acclaim, however, for his recent book "Nixon Agonistes." John Leonard in the New York Times calls it "an astonishing book . . . which reads like a combination of H. L. Mencken, John Locke and Albert Camus." John Barkham in the Saturday Review states, "His book on Nixon should establish him as a political analyst of the first rank — intelligent, incisive, inseeing with a style and approach all his own."

Wills, who graduated from Campion in 1951, began his writing career in William F. Buckley's National Review. But while he has written extensively for conservative publications, his breadth of view cannot be confined by a label. He has opposed our role in the Vietnam war. He has criticized John Mitchell's policies in Washington. While covering the 1968 national conventions for the National Review, he spent days among the Chicago kids and depicted their fate with sympathy.

Wills brings to his journalism distinct intelligence, an incisive wit, and the inclinations of a scholar. His education includes five years in the Jesuit order. He received his doctorate in the classics at Yale University and taught for several years at Johns Hopkins University. At present he lives in Baltimore with his wife, Natalie and three children.

## State Singles Champ

Senior John Schrup hasn't lost a singles match while playing for Campion in dual competition for the last three years. In the WISAA state competition at Oshkosh as a sophomore, John lost in the semi-finals. Last year, as a junior, he advanced to the finals but lost to Mike Cahill of Waukesha Catholic Memorial. This year, John strode swiftly through his opponents, defeated all but one in straight sets, and allowed a miserly 13 games to his opponents while stacking up 54 games won in four matches of tournament play. He was seeded first and had a bye in round one.

St. Joseph's Kenosha was second with a 336. Madison Edgewood took third with a 337. LaCrosse Aquinas and Racine St. Catherine's tied for fourth with 338's.

Medalist for the meet was Stan Postorini of St. Catherine's with a 74.

This culminates, for Campion, a very successful season. Besides the State Crown, Campion also won the Conference Tournament, and the Milwaukee Pio Nono Invitational Tournament.

## Excerpts from a Letter on Secondary Education from Father Arrupe to the American Jesuits

On Mar. 7, 1971, Pedro Arrupe, S.J., Father General of the Society of Jesus sent a letter to the Jesuits in the United States on secondary education. This letter came after Father Arrupe reviewed the work of the Society in high schools in America before approving the Constitution of the new Jesuit Secondary Education Association. Because his ideas speak directly to the work we are trying to do at Campion and because they reinforce our efforts and confirm our directions, I felt parents and alumni would appreciate the chance to see some excerpts from the letter.

*Gregory F. Lucey, S.J.*

See your entire educational activity as a *communitarian*. Each lay teacher, in accordance with his talents and willingness to serve, should share responsibility for the school on an *equal footing with yourselves*. Your unique contribution as religious is to share freely what you have received as a gift in your vocation: a call to discerning understanding of the redemptive design of God and to a share in the consecratory and teaching power of the priesthood of Christ.

During their years in secondary school young men are still relatively free to listen and to explore. The world has not yet closed in on them. They are concerned about the deeper questions of the "why" and "wherefore" of life. They can dream impossible dreams and be stirred by the vision of what might be. The Society has committed so much of its personnel and resources to secondary school students precisely because they are questing for the sources of life "beyond academic excellence." Surely, every teacher worthy of the name must believe in young people and want to encourage their reaching for the stars. This means that your own *unifying vision* of life must be tantalizingly attractive to your students, inviting them to dialogue on the things that count. It must encourage them to internalize attitudes of deep and universal compassion for their suffering fellow men and to transform themselves into men of peace and justice, committed to be agents of change in a world which recognizes how widespread is injustice, how pervasive the forces of oppression.

Admittedly, this is not an easy task. For your students come largely from comfortable or even affluent families. Like all of us in our pre-reflective years, they have unconsciously accepted values which are incompatible with the limpid foolishness of the Beatitudes. More than young men of a previous generation, they have more justifiable "reasons" for walking away in sadness when they see the implications of a Christian vision of life and the *metanoia* which leads to rejection of softness and the distortedly glamorous image of life purveyed in slick magazines and cheap films. They are exposed, as perhaps no generation in history, to the lure of drugs and the flight from painful reality which they promise.

These young men need confidence as they look to their future; strength as they face their own misery and weakness; manly understanding and love in the teachers with whom they explore the awesome mystery of life . . .

Your work as teachers is to instruct your students and at the same time to learn with and from them. You will learn from them how they look on their family — parents, brothers, and sisters — and should be able to see how you can be of assistance to the parents at times by explaining to them facets of their boy's personality and interpreting to the boy those views and attitudes of the parents which they find difficult to understand.

If changes in the world and in the Church have caught some of us by surprise and upset us, it should not astonish us that some parents are bewildered by what they see about them. It has never been a simple task for parents to guide their children through adolescence and its tensions. Today, it is more difficult than ever. The normal parental concern for the well-being of a child is good. But a pervasive fear of the future is corroding. It disheartens parents and, as it communicates itself to children, induces different forms of pessimism. In its extreme form, it is not compatible with a Christian understanding of history and of Christ as the Lord of life and death. You must help parents look to the future with confidence.

Parents of your students have a claim on you. Be understanding and sympathetic with them as they seek your counsel concerning their children. Help them work through to a deeper understanding of their role as their child seeks that greater freedom which an adolescent needs as he seeks to establish his identity. Your own experience has shown you that parents often want to discuss matters concerning themselves and their own understanding of life. As you work to make your school a true community of students, teachers, and parents, opportunities for such individual and group discussions will multiply. As you examine your use of time, plan to be available to parents even more than you have been.

You may find that on some basic issues there is disagreement between what you teach in the classroom and what the parents teach, through word and example, at home. Such a situation can be painful, for all concerned. Because of such differences of opinion you cannot water down your teaching — providing, of course, that it is solidly based and responsibly prepared — nor on the other hand can you heedlessly upset that family harmony which is so important for the balanced development of the normal child. In such a situation, you should use every means to explore with the parents the reasons for the disagreement and try to come to such an understanding of their position that you can help their boy to respect and honor them, even if he cannot accept their views.
