### Giving Program Seeks \$175,000

Campion kicked off its 1970-71 Annual Giving Program on November 1, with chairman, Robert C. Weber '37 announcing a goal of \$175,000. Mr. Weber, himself an alumnus, is a member of the Campion Board of Regents, a Past President of the Chicago Fathers' Club, and his son Robert C. Jr. is a graduate of 1966. He also announced the division chairmen as Thomas P. McErlean, Parents, and M. J. Moriarty '43, Alumni.

Again this year the program will be extended to all parents, alumni, past parents, businesses, and friends of Campion. The campaign will run through the fiscal year and end on June 30, 1971. In encouraging everyone to give, Mr. Weber stated, "In light of the heavy financial pressure on all private education, it is most important that we continue to support Campion. Now more than ever we must make sacrifices for our fine school."

The parents' division, under Mr. McErlean, will attempt to personally contact over 200 parents using 51 co-chairmen. The remaining parents will be contacted by mail and telephone. The goal this year for the parents is \$75,000. Mr. McErlean was hopeful this part of the program could be completed before Christmas.

After a successful alumni program last year which went over its goal of \$30,000; Mr. Moriarty announced the alumni are taking aim this year at a goal of \$50,000 and 20% participation. In addition to a letter from the alumni chairman, each class chairman will contact the members of his class in behalf of the Alumni Fund.

Later in the program a personal contact will be made to the parents and businesses in Prairie du Chien area.

### Patrick J. Lucey '35 Elected Governor

Patrick J. Lucey '35, a political pro with a Kennedy-Irish philosophy, captured the governorship of Wisconsin after six years of Republican control by defeating Lt. Gov. Jack B. Olson.

Lucey, the son of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Lucey of Prairie du Chien, was born in La Crosse, and spent much of his life in Southwestern Wisconsin with six brothers and sisters. He attended Campion and the University of Wisconsin.

He married the former Jean Vlasis in 1951 and they have three children; Paul 18, Laurie 16, and David 14. Lucey and his wife operate a successful real estate business in Madison.

In 1948 Lucey began his political career by winning the Crawford County assembly seat. Later he ran unsuccessfully for congress and then engineered Gaylord Nelson's successful bid

### Blessed Edmund Campion is now a Saint Brother Daley Attends Ceremony

On Sunday, October 25, the bells of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome tolled, announcing the canonization of 40 English, Welsh and Irish priests, religious Brothers and laymen who sacrificed their lives for their Faith during an epoch of religious persecution. Among these was Blessed Edmund Campion, the patron of Campion Jesuit High School. Ten of those canonized were members of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits.)



Brother Robert F. Daley, S.J. represented Campion High School at the canonization ceremonies in Rome. The choice of Brother Daley to represent Campion High School is most appropriate. For over a quarter of a century Brother Daley has been the Registrar. His friends

among the alumni number into the thousands. His unflinching memory and his ability to recall faces and names both amazes and rejoices his legions of friends.

Because of his prolonged contact with Campion alumni since his arrival in 1938, Brother Daley was presented the honor to represent the school faculty, alumni and alumni parents in Rome during the canonization of Blessed Edmund Campion. Many Campion Alumni and friends throughout the country have been most generous in subsidizing his travel expense which included a short stay in London, the scene of Campion's work as a priest and his martyrdom on Tyburn Hill under Queen Elizabeth.

In a recent communication from Rome, Bro. Daley participated in the following program of events: Sunday, October 25, 10:00 a.m. Canonization Ceremony and Mass, Basilica of St. Peter. Monday, October 26, Vatican: Cortile San Damaso: Special Papal audience for English and Welsh Pilgrims followed by concelebrated Mass at the Basilica of St. Paul by English and Welsh hierarchy. Tuesday, October 27, at the Basilica of St. Mary Major, concelebrated Mass by Welsh and English hierarchy. Wednesday, October 28, at the Church of the Jesu, Piazza Di Gesu, (the principal Jesuit Church in Rome) concelebrated Mass in Latin by Roman Cardinals, Superiors General of religious Orders.

At Campion special ceremonies and social activities were planned. On Sunday, Oct. 25, day of canonization the Jesuit community invited all of the faculty to a dinner followed by a liturgical celebration in the evening.

A noon liturgy for the student body was held based on a theme of Blessed Edmund Campion, now canonized to sainthood.

## National Merit Scholars

Principal Rev. G. F. Lucey, S.J., has announced that three students at Campion Jesuit High School have been named Semi-finalists in the 1970-71 National Merit Scholarship Program. They are:



Charles Chester, Chicago, Illinois, Michael Dosch, Grayling, Michigan and Jack Simms, Mt. Norris, Michigan. Chester is President of the Campion Student Body Congress; Dosch is Social Chairman, and Simms was a quarterback on last year's football team.

The Semi-finalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT), which was given last February to some 710,000 students in 17,000 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one per cent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

About 96 per cent of the Semi-finalists are expected to become Finalists, and each will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships which are allocated by state. Many will also be considered for the renewable four-year Merit Scholarships provided by some 500 corporations, unions, foundations, trusts, professional associations, other organizations, and individuals. Each finalist will receive a certificate of Merit in recognition of his outstanding performance in the program.

Letters of Commendation honoring them for their high performance on the 1970 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) have been awarded to eight students at Campion,

Commended students are Kevin C. Behrens, Greg Heberlein, Michael Jassak, Michael Kondzella, Michael Kurt, William McErlean, Michael F. Scheck, and Russell Williams.

They are among 35,000 students in the United States who scored in the upper 2 percent of those who are expected to graduate from high school in 1971.

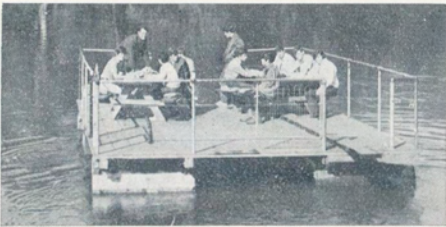
Miss Lysne was chosen by a panel of three Campion faculty on the basis of personality, poise, and academic interests. She was among six young ladies considered for the honor.

## A Floating Classroom for Campion Hydrobiology

A floating classroom, affectionately christened "The Titanic" is being used by the biology department of Campion High. It may be the only floating biology classroom on the upper Mississippi River.

In addition to a standard curriculum, the biology department of Campion, under the direction of Jerry McCarthy, offers two distinctive courses: environmental biology and hydrobiology.

The hydrobiology seminar uses the river and the floating classroom from early September until the river freezes, and from early spring to the end of the school year in late May. The floating classroom enables students to sample river bacteria and run on-the-spot analyses for coliform bacteria, oxygen demand indices, phosphates, nitrates, and detergents.



Portable testing equipment enables a class to compare the water quality of different streams in the Upper Mississippi River Basin. Because such tests demand controlled experimentation, hydrobiology is offered only to those students who have previously completed a one-year

laboratory-science course. A gas-powered electrical generator on "The Titanic" runs the necessary laboratory equipment.

Environmental biology is presented during the first quarter of the school year. The object of this study is various biological aspects of the environment, particularly those supplied by the Mississippi River and Campion Island. Students are involved on one of three basic activities: a macroscopic and microscopic survey of aquatic organisms; a terrestrial plant and animal survey of an island; and an in-depth study of a subject area of particular interest such as the physiology of an invertebrate, or photosynthesis.

Students scoop mud and vegetation from different levels of the river and from the shores of the channel and sloughs to examine micro-organisms. Several islands are sectioned with each student being assigned a quadrant. He will discover what type of life exists there.

Each of these activities will include laboratory work done in the Campion boat house which has been converted to a riverside laboratory. The environmental biology program is designed to stimulate independent study so that when the students are forced indoors by cold weather they will bring with them both a knowledge of the diversity of life forms and a desire to know how these organisms are related to each other and to man.

for governor in 1958. At that time he became chairman of the Wisconsin Democratic Party. One of the first politicians to recognize John Kennedy's potential, he worked very closely with the late President and his brother, Robert.

In his first race against Olson for Lt. Governor in 1964, he was victorious even though a Republican was elected Governor. Against Governor Warren Knowles in 1966, Lucey lost his first bid for the state house by 84,000 votes.

To obtain the Democratic nomination this year, Lucey started in 1969 and skillfully maneuvered to eliminate other prospective candidates one by one. He won the Democratic primary by 70,000 votes and in a campaign centered around taxes, Lucey swamped Olson by over 125,000 votes.

## Blessed Edmund Campion Becomes Saint Edmund Campion

St. Edmund Campion was born of fallen away Catholic parents in London about 1540. At the age of 15 he was given a scholarship to St. John's College, Oxford, where he made a name for himself as an orator; he spoke at several funerals and before Queen Elizabeth herself. Campion had taken the infamous oath of Supremacy, and although his Anglican beliefs were much shaken by his readings in the Fathers of the Church, nonetheless he was ordained a Deacon in the Anglican Church. However, after a short stay at Oxford he began to be troubled by his reception of Orders in the Church whose beliefs he doubted. Shortly thereafter he left for a short stay in Dublin, and while there wrote a history of Ireland.

When Pope Pius' Bull against Elizabeth was published, he felt himself in no little danger because of his Catholic tendencies. In 1571 he returned to England in disguise, and got a passport to Belgium, took his Bachelor of Divinity and was ordained a subdeacon (of the Catholic Church) at Douay, and in 1573 went to Rome and was received into the Society of Jesus.

In 1579, Campion and Father Robert Persons were chosen as the first Jesuits to go to England. The night before his departure, one of the Jesuit Fathers at Prague, on some mysterious impulse, wrote on his door: "P. Edmundus Campianus, Martyr." Campion arrived in England in 1580 disguised as a jewel merchant with his servant, coadjutor brother, Ralph Emerson.

During the next year and a half he worked throughout southern England, constantly being trailed, and all the while he was writing his *Decem Rationes*, ten reasons why he had challenged the most learned Protestants openly to discuss religion with him. This treatise was secretly printed, and on June 27, 1581, four hundred copies of it were found on the benches of the University Church at Oxford. This caused an immediate reaction. Efforts to capture him were redoubled.

Three weeks later, on Sunday, July 16, he said Mass for about 40 people in the home of a Mrs. Yate at Lyford; but among these 40 was a traitor, George Eliot. Within the next 12 hours the house was searched fruitlessly three times. However, on the 4th search someone in the trap cellar, where the priests were hidden, stumbled

and fell, thus giving away the hiding place. From Lyford, Campion and his companions were taken to the Tower of London and were racked and tortured. Soon he was labeled: "Campion, the seditious Jesuit." In the next three days after his arrival at the Tower he was questioned by many notables, among them Queen Elizabeth and the Earl of Leicester, but all of them failed. The Queen herself tried to bribe him into apostasy. While still broken by torture, he was thrice confronted by Protestant dignitaries whose insinuations he effectively and convincingly rebutted.

He was fiercely racked, but still to no avail. Finally, on November 14th, he was indicted in Westminster Hall on a trumped up charge of treason. He was found guilty after an hour's debate by the jury. During his last days he was visited by his sister who offered him a goodly reward for his defection, and by his betrayer, Eliot, whom he freely forgave, even recommending him to a German noble with whom he would be safe. On December 1, on a wet and muddy day, Campion was led, racked and drawn, through the streets of Tyburn. On the scaffold he again refused to commit himself on Pope Pius' Bull, and publicly prayed for the Queen. He was then executed with the usual barbarities. It is widely believed that as he hung dying, his blood spilled on a young gentleman who was present, one Henry Walpole. He, too, became a Jesuit and a Martyr.

Campion is a saint for our times. He developed within himself, through much thought, study and prayer, his personal religious convictions; convictions contrary to his parent's Anglican beliefs, convictions in opposition with the popular trends of the day, convictions which led to violations of the law of the land and the wishes of his Queen. Campion critically questioned both the tradition handed on to him and the novelties of the day. He continually developed his faith in his adult life and would not compromise his convictions even in the face of death.

Each of us has had to face a crisis of faith in recent years as the new theology touched our lives. We must open ourselves to growth in our faith through thought, study and prayer, we must be steadfast in living our faith. By following the example of Campion in this we will declare beyond question the importance of faith to our youth.
